Background

Concessional finances, which are grants or loans given at preferential rates by financial institutions such as the World Bank, help to address fiscal inequalities and enable development in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs).²⁷⁴ To this end, the World Bank’s concessional finance is essential to address “globally significant development challenges” including climate change, mitigation and resilience, healthcare, water and sanitation, and education and to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) set out by the United Nations. As such, G20 leaders have mentioned concessional financing or the World Bank in relation to development at G20 summits since the 2009 London Summit where they committed to using USD6 billion in flexible concessional finance to support the poorest countries worldwide.²⁷⁵

At the 2009 Pittsburgh Summit, G20 leaders reaffirmed their support of concessional financing to low-income countries and reiterated their commitment to supporting the Multilateral Development Banks (MDBs) such as the International Development Agency and African Development Fund to this end.²⁷⁶

At the 2010 Toronto Summit, G20 leaders reaffirmed their commitment to supporting and replenishing the MDBs' concessional lending facilities.²⁷⁷ G20 leaders also announced the successful completion of their 2009 Pittsburgh Summit commitment to provide the MDBs with USD350 billion in capital increases to support concessional lending.

At the 2012 Los Cabos Summit, G20 leaders recognized the importance of inclusive green growth and sustainable development to achieve economic and developmental goals.²⁷⁸ They also acknowledged the importance of social safety nets and both public and private sector investment for development, especially in developing countries.

At the 2013 St. Petersburg Summit, G20 leaders recognized the actions of the World Bank and Regional Development Banks to “catalyze additional financing for infrastructure investment, particularly in emerging markets and developing countries.”²⁷⁹ To this end, G20 leaders encouraged long-term investment financing and endorsed the G20-Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development High-Level Principles of Long-Term Investment Financing by Institutional Investors.

At the 2014 Brisbane Summit, G20 leaders reaffirmed their commitment to supporting MDBs and encouraging national development banks to providing additional lending to low-income countries and pledged to improve infrastructure benefits for them.²⁸⁰ G20 leaders also welcomed the establishment of the World Bank Group's Global Infrastructure Facility which aims to increase “private sector investment in developing countries.”

At the 2019 Osaka Summit, G20 leaders recognized developing countries' efforts to achieve the SDGs and recognized the importance of innovative financing mechanisms such as public-private investments and blended finance to advance development.²⁸¹

At the 2021 Rome Summit, G20 leaders reaffirmed their commitment to advancing the SDGs and ensuring equitable and sustainable recovery after the Covid-19 pandemic.²⁸² G20 leaders also acknowledged the importance of MDBs to achieve the “high financing needs of low-income countries,” committing to replenishing MDBs to support this objective.

At the 2022 Bali Summit, G20 leaders committed to supporting the implementation of the SDGs by investing in innovative financing sources and instruments for LMICs and other developing countries.²⁸³ G20 leaders also called on the MDBs to provide additional financing opportunities to address global challenges and promote sustainable development and infrastructure investments.

At the 2023 New Delhi Summit, G20 leaders committed to “collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost the World Bank’s capacity to support low and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.”²⁸⁴ They also recognized the need for innovative financing mechanisms such as blended finance and risk-sharing facilities as well as concessional financing for developing countries to advance climate action and forest protection.

At the 2024 Rio Summit, G20 leaders reaffirmed their commitment made in the New Delhi Leaders’ Declaration “to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.”²⁸⁵ They emphasized the need for a clear framework to allocate limited concessional resources effectively while ensuring strong support for the poorest countries.

Commitment Features

The overarching welfare target of this commitment is to support the poorest, low- and middle-income countries to address a range of global challenges. To do so, G20 members have agreed to directly support the World Bank by taking action to collectively mobilize more 1) headroom finance, 2) concessional finance, based on 3) a clear framework for how such resources will be fairly allocated. There are therefore three criteria each G20 member must take strong action on in order to advance the welfare target. Only G20 members that contribute financially to the World Bank will be assessed for compliance, excluding the African Union which is a recipient institution that does not contribute to the World Bank.

Definitions and Concepts

“Reaffirm” is understood to mean to “affirm again” whereby affirm is to assert strongly, state as fact, confirm or ratify a judgment.²⁸⁶

“Mobilize” is understood to mean “to organize or prepare something, such as a group of people, for a purpose.”²⁸⁷ In the context of this commitment, it refers to the mobilization of headroom and concessional finance for the World Bank.

“More” refers to “a greater quantity, number, or amount.”²⁸⁸ G20 members are required to mobilize a greater number of resources in 2025, than in 2024, to achieve full compliance for the commitment. As the World Bank’s financial data is primarily focused on fiscal year distributions, this commitment will use fiscal year allocations, as well as calendar year allocations where available, to determine compliance. The World Bank’s fiscal year “begins on July 1st of the previous year and runs through June 30th of the designated year.”²⁸⁹

“Headroom” is understood to mean “any undrawn amount (i.e. amount remaining available) under a finance agreement.”²⁹⁰ “More headroom” is understood to mean an increase in the undrawn or unused amount remaining available to a country. More fiscal headroom, in terms of lending, refers to the increase in the lending capacity of a country towards another.

“Concessional finance” is understood to mean “below market rate finance provided by major financial institutions, such as development banks and multilateral funds, to developing countries to accelerate development objectives.”²⁹¹

The World Bank Group is “an international development organization owned by 189 countries” that supports lending capacity for poorer countries to address global challenges and pursue development-related projects.²⁹² The World Bank is comprised of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) which “lends to low- and middle-income countries,” the International Development Association (IDA) which “lends to low-income countries,” the International Finance Corporation (IFC) which “lends to the private sector,” the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA) which “encourages private companies to invest in foreign countries” and the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes which manages dispute resolution.

The IDA is primarily funded through contributions by members during its replenishment processes.²⁹³ The 21st replenishment (IDA21) will be used to finance initiatives between 1 July 2025-30 June 2028. Contributions to IDA21 will count towards compliance for this commitment.

“Upon joining the IBRD, each member is assigned shares issued at par value and pays (or can be called upon to pay) a capital subscription to the IBRD that is equal to its shareholdings.”²⁹⁴ A capital subscription can be understood to mean “a sum of money given or pledged as a contribution, payment, investment, etc.” to belong to an organization.²⁹⁵ The IBRD expresses subscription amounts in “US dollars of the weight and fineness in effect on July 1, 1944.”²⁹⁶ For the purposes of this report, this amount will be referred to as USD[amount] (in 1944 currency).

Membership in the IFC is open to World Bank members and is accompanied with a subscription in capital stock.²⁹⁷ The IFC expresses subscription amounts in thousands of USD.

“Membership in MIGA requires subscription of capital stock.”²⁹⁸ MIGA expresses subscription amounts in Special Drawing Rights (SDR). “The SDR is an international reserve asset. The SDR is not a currency, but its value is based on a basket of five currencies – the US dollar, the euro, the Chinese renminbi, the Japanese yen, and the British pound sterling.”²⁹⁹

Additionally, the World Bank uses trusts funds to “complement core funding” for its institutions, for the purpose of mobilizing and directing “concessional resources to strategic development priorities and to mobilize the resources and capabilities of other development actors through partnership programs.”³⁰⁰

“Trust funds” are understood to mean “a financing arrangement set up with contributions from one or more development partners.” These funds include bank-executed trust funds, recipient-executed trust funds which have “third party executing agencies” and Financial Intermediary Funds that the World Bank is a trustee for.³⁰¹

“Co-financing” is understood to mean arrangements in which “World Bank resources and third-party resources are deployed in a coordinated manner to World Bank operations.”³⁰² Co-financing is key for mobilizing resources, supporting concessional lending, increasing “efficiencies through reduced transaction costs for client countries” and “leveraging the comparative advantages of co-financiers.”

“Low-and middle-income countries” are defined according to gross national income (GNI).³⁰³ “For the current 2024 fiscal year, low-income economies are defined as those with a GNI per capita, calculated using the World Bank Atlas method, of [USD]1,135 or less in 2022. Lower middle-income economies are those with a GNI per capita between [USD]1,136 and [USD]4,465; upper middle-income economies are those with a GNI per capita between [USD]4,466 and [USD]13,845; high-income economies are those with a GNI per capita of [USD]13,846 or more, according to the World Bank Country and Lending Groups.”

“Global challenges” are understood to mean the challenges faced by all countries related to poverty, climate change, inequality, peace, justice and environmental degradation.³⁰⁴

“Scarce” is understood to mean “deficient in quantity or number compared with the demand.”³⁰⁵

“Concessional resources” is understood to mean debt as lending extended by creditors at terms that are below the market.³⁰⁶

“Strong support” is understood to mean financial support that “can take the following forms: grants, interest-free loans or equity investments, and can be referred to as foreign aid, humanitarian assistance, development aid or official development aid.”³⁰⁷

“Poorest countries” is understood to mean “low-income countries confronting severe structural impediments to sustainable development. They are highly vulnerable to economic and environmental shocks and have low levels of human assets.”³⁰⁸

General Interpretive Guidelines

Full compliance, or a score of +1, will be given to a G20 member that takes strong action in all three of the commitment criteria which require G20 members to collectively mobilize more 1) headroom finance and 2) concessional finance, based on 3) a clear framework for how such resources will be fairly allocated. Actions taken towards this commitment must support the overarching welfare target of supporting the poorest, low- and middle-income countries to address a range of global challenges.

To achieve full compliance, a G20 member must mobilize more headroom finance across at least three of the following five components of the World Bank: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds. Examples of mobilizing more headroom finance include increasing core contributions to the IFC, IBRD or MIGA, contributing more to the IDA's 21st replenishment than the 20th replenishment, increasing funding for the World Bank's trust funds and co-financing initiatives with World Bank institutions, including the IDA and IFC, to support low- and middle-income countries in addressing global challenges. Examples of strong action to mobilize more concessional finance include contributing to the World Bank's Executive Board of Directors meetings to approve concessional loans, grants or equity investments for the poorest LMICs, unlocking new concessional financing for the World Bank to increase its concessional lending capacity, implementing debt relief programs through the World Bank and co-financing initiatives to provide concessional loans to LMICs. Co-financing through multilateral funds which include a G20 member on its Board of Directors will also count towards compliance. For this commitment, a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources can include an extension of a current framework or the development of a new framework that provides new solutions for financing.

Partial compliance, or a score of 0, will be assigned to a G20 member that takes strong action across two of the three commitment criteria or weak action across all three criteria to collectively mobilize more 1) headroom finance and 2) concessional finance, based on 3) a clear framework for how such resources will be fairly allocated. Examples of actions that count towards partial compliance include verbal reaffirmations of support towards the commitment and informal discussions regarding a clear framework for resources. A G20 member that maintains its contribution across three of the five components of the World Bank or increases its contribution in two of the five components will also receive partial compliance.

Non-compliance, or a score of -1, will be assigned if the G20 member fails to take action towards the commitment, takes weak action in two or less of the three criteria, does not take action to directly support the World Bank, or takes action that is directly and explicitly antithetical to the commitment. A G20 member that decreases its funding for more than two of the five components of the World Bank will receive a score of non-compliance.

Argentina: 0

Argentina has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Paraguay, Peru and Uruguay Olga Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.³⁰⁹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.³¹⁰ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.³¹¹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.³¹² Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.³¹³ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.³¹⁴ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.³¹⁵ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.³¹⁶ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.³¹⁷

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."³¹⁸ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.³¹⁹ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.³²⁰ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.³²¹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.³²² This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.³²³ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.³²⁴

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.³²⁵ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.³²⁶ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.³²⁷ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.³²⁸ This

project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and “a human resource certification system.”

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.³²⁹ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany’s KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh’s project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.³³⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.³³¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal’s bridge systems project.³³² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.³³³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Argentina’s representative at the Global Environmental Facility Council Mauricio Gonzales and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.³³⁴

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Economy Luis Andres Caputo and the IDA’s Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA’s 21st replenishment (IDA21).³³⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Argentina will contribute USD12.5 million to IDA21 between 1

July 2025 and 30 June 2028.³³⁶ This marks an increase from Argentina's pledge of USD3 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.³³⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.³³⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.³³⁹

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.³⁴⁰ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.³⁴¹

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.³⁴²

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.³⁴³ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.³⁴⁴

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.³⁴⁵

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Fuentes Rocio Valdes Sepulveda and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.³⁴⁶ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.³⁴⁷ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.³⁴⁸ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Argentina has a total subscription

amount of USD323,320,000.³⁴⁹ This amount is the same as Argentina's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.³⁵⁰

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Argentina has a total subscription amount of SDR22.1 million.³⁵¹ This amount is the same as Argentina's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.³⁵²

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Argentina has a total subscription amount of USD2,889.7 million (in 1944 currency).³⁵³ This is an increase in the total subscription amount from 17 May 2024, which was USD2806 million (in 1944 currency).³⁵⁴ Therefore, Argentina has mobilized more headroom finance for the IBRD.

Argentina has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Argentina has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address a number of development challenges in these countries. Argentina has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21 and the IBRD and co-financing World Bank initiatives through the Global Environmental Facility. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Argentina receives a score of 0.

in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 22 November 2024, the World Bank released a report outlining recommendations and an action plan for Vietnam's electric mobility roadmap.³⁵⁵ This report received funding from the Australian government under the Australia-World Bank Strategic Partnership, underscoring Australia's role in supporting Vietnam's green energy transformation efforts.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Australia, Korea and other members Robert Bruce Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.³⁵⁶ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.³⁵⁷ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Australia's representative Mark Lloyd and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.³⁵⁸ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.³⁵⁹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.³⁶⁰ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar

Pradesh, India.³⁶¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.³⁶² This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.³⁶³ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.³⁶⁴ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.³⁶⁵

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."³⁶⁶ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.³⁶⁷ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus

on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.³⁶⁸ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.³⁶⁹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.³⁷⁰ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.³⁷¹ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.³⁷²

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.³⁷³ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment’s focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.³⁷⁴ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA’s Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the

sector in Pakistan.³⁷⁵ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.³⁷⁶ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.³⁷⁷ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 25 March 2025, Treasurer Jim Chalmers delivered the 2025-2026 federal budget to Parliament.³⁷⁸ The budget notes that Australia will contribute AUD660 million to the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21) over the next three years as part of its Official Development Assistance Budget.³⁷⁹ Of this, AUD247.7 million is expected to be allocated to the IDA during the 2025-2026 period, marking an increase from AUD180.8 million for 2024-2025. This action mobilizes more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.³⁸⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.³⁸¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.³⁸² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.³⁸³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Director at the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Richard Bontjer and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.³⁸⁴

On 15 April 2025, Treasurer Chalmers and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for IDA21.³⁸⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and confirms that Australia will contribute AUD660 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from Australia's pledge of AUD488.1 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.³⁸⁶

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.³⁸⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.³⁸⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.³⁸⁹

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.³⁹⁰ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.³⁹¹

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.³⁹²

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.³⁹³ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.³⁹⁴

On 12 May 2025, Assistant Secretary of Climate Diplomacy and Development at the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Jean-Bernard Carrasco and the IBRD's Director of Trust Funds and Partner Relations Maitreyi B Das signed an agreement whereby Australia will provide AUD50 million for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage.³⁹⁵ AUD10 million of this sum was deposited by 30 June 2025, with the remainder expected in 2026-2027.

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.³⁹⁶

On 15 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.³⁹⁷ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.³⁹⁸ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.³⁹⁹ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Australia has a total subscription amount of USD463,234,000.⁴⁰⁰ This amount is the same as Australia's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁰¹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Australia has a total subscription amount of SDR30.19 million.⁴⁰² This amount is the same as Australia's subscription amount

from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁰³

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁴⁰⁴ The data reveals that Australia decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD134,111,111 in fiscal year 2024 to USD119,993,919 in fiscal year 2025. This amount includes AUD10 million for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage, as announced on 12 May 2025.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Australia has a total subscription amount of USD3905.4 million (in 1944 currency).⁴⁰⁵ This amount is the same as Australia's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁰⁶

Australia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Australia has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Australia has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21 and the World Bank's trust funds, co-financing through the Global Environmental Facility and by maintaining its contribution amount for the IBRD, IFC and MIGA. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Australia receives a score of 0.

Brazil: 0

Brazil has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Brazil, Colombia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Haiti, Panama, Philippines, Suriname and Trinidad and Tobago Marcos Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development

(IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁴⁰⁷ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁴⁰⁸ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁴⁰⁹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁴¹⁰ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁴¹¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁴¹² This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁴¹³ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁴¹⁴ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁴¹⁵

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁴¹⁶ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁴¹⁷ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁴¹⁸ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁴¹⁹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.⁴²⁰ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁴²¹ The framework will focus on

policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁴²²

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁴²³ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, Secretary of Public Integrity Livia Oliveira and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁴²⁴ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Secretary Oliveira and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁴²⁵ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁴²⁶ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the

sector in Pakistan.⁴²⁷ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁴²⁸ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁴²⁹ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁴³⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁴³¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁴³² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁴³³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Head of the

Environmental Policy Division at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Luciana Melchert Saguas Presas and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁴³⁴

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Fernando Haddad and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁴³⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Brazil will contribute BRL528 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase in Brazil's pledge, after not contributing to IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴³⁶

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁴³⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁴³⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁴³⁹

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁴⁴⁰ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁴⁴¹

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁴⁴²

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁴⁴³ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁴⁴⁴

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁴⁴⁵

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Alan Asprilla and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁴⁴⁶ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁴⁴⁷ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Chiliatto and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁴⁴⁸ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Brazil has a total subscription amount of USD476,630,000.⁴⁴⁹ This marks an increase from Brazil's subscription amount of USD423,812,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁵⁰

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Brazil has a total subscription amount of SDR26.06 million.⁴⁵¹ This amount is the same as Brazil's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁵²

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁴⁵³ The data reveals that Brazil decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD6,440,000 in fiscal year 2024 to USD1,000,000 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Brazil has a total subscription amount of USD5,350.9 million (in 1944 currency).⁴⁵⁴ This amount is the same as Brazil's subscription amount as of 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁴⁵⁵

Brazil has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Brazil has participated in World Bank meetings to provide

concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Brazil has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21 and the IFC and by maintaining its contribution amount for MIGA and the IBRD. Brazil has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported several World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Brazil receives a score of 0.

Canada: 0

Canada has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Canada, Ireland and other members Katharine Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁴⁵⁶ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁴⁵⁷ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Canada's representative Ruth Lawson and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.⁴⁵⁸ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster

and climate preparedness.⁴⁵⁹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁴⁶⁰ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁴⁶¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁴⁶² This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁴⁶³ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁴⁶⁴ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁴⁶⁵

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of

Tanzania.”⁴⁶⁶ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office’s Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank’s Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁴⁶⁷ The changes aim to improve the independence, “effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process” through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment’s focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁴⁶⁸ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁴⁶⁹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁴⁷⁰ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁴⁷¹ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁴⁷²

On 27 January 2025, the International Finance Corporation (IFC) announced a USD15 million loan for Kenya’s Royal Apparel EPZ Limited to support business expansion and women’s employment in the

country.⁴⁷³ Of this, USD5 million will be allocated through the Canada-IFC advancing Gender Equality, Resilience, Opportunity and Inclusion Worldwide Facility which is funded by Canada.

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁴⁷⁴ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 26 February 2025, Deputy Director of the Mozambique Bilateral Development Program at Global Affairs Canada Meaghan Byers and Country Director for Mozambique, Madagascar, Comoros, Seychelles and Mauritius at the IBRD and IDA Idah Z Pswarayi-Riddihough signed an administration agreement whereby Canada will provide CAD55 million for the District and Community Health Services Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁴⁷⁵ Of this, CAD12,450,000 was submitted on 26 February 2025, with the remainder expected between 2026 and 2028.

On 27 February 2025, Executive Director at Global Affairs Canada Andrew Hurst and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁴⁷⁶ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the IFC's battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Executive Director Hurst and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁴⁷⁷ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁴⁷⁸ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁴⁷⁹ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 18 March 2025, the IFC and Inter-American Development Bank Invest announced a USD13.5 million investment for Solengy Haiti S.A., a solar energy company in Haiti.⁴⁸⁰ Of this, USD6 million will be provided through the Canada-IFC Blended Climate Finance Program. This funding will support 10 megawatts-peak in solar energy and 20 megawatts-hours of energy storage, supporting energy distribution, resilience and transformation.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁴⁸¹ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁴⁸² This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁴⁸³ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁴⁸⁴ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁴⁸⁵ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 1 April 2025, the IFC announced EUR2 million in financing for First African Company SA to support access to nutritious foods, including dairy and fruit products, in Cameroon.⁴⁸⁶ Of this, a EUR1 million concessional loan will be provided through the Canada Facility for Resilient Food Systems. This investment will support food security in the country.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁴⁸⁷ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Director General at Global Affairs Canada Cam Do and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁴⁸⁸

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance François-Philippe Champagne and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁴⁸⁹ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Canada will contribute CAD1,636.04 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from Canada's pledge of CAD1,472.5 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁴⁹⁰

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal

Access Program.⁴⁹¹ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁴⁹²

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁴⁹³

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁴⁹⁴ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁴⁹⁵

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁴⁹⁶

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁴⁹⁷ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁴⁹⁸

On 13 May 2025, Canada and the IFC announced a USD5 million investment for Husk Power Energy Systems Nigeria Limited.⁴⁹⁹ Of this, a USD2.5 million revolving concessional loan will be provided through the Canada-IFC Renewable Energy Program for Africa. This financing will “expand access to reliable, renewable energy in underserved communities across Nigeria” by supporting the development of 108 mini-grid sites aimed at providing energy to 115,000 people and businesses.

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh’s recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country’s resilience to future disasters.⁵⁰⁰

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Rechico Cormac Mangan and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁵⁰¹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁵⁰² This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Rechico and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁵⁰³ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Canada has a total subscription amount of USD796,137,000.⁵⁰⁴ This

amount is the same as Canada's subscription amount from 15 April 2024.⁵⁰⁵ This amount does not include Canada's co-financing initiatives with the IFC.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Canada has a total subscription amount of SDR52.25 million.⁵⁰⁶ This amount is the same as Canada's subscription amount as of 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁵⁰⁷

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁵⁰⁸ The data reveals that Canada decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD517,967,328 in fiscal year 2024 to USD417,743,606 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank. This amount includes CAD12,450,000 deposited for the District and Community Health Services Multi-Donor Trust Fund on 26 February 2025.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Canada has a total subscription amount of USD7,045.5 million (in 1944 currency).⁵⁰⁹ This amount is the same as Canada's subscription amount as of 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁵¹⁰

Canada has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Canada has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Canada has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21 and the IFC through subscriptions and co-financing, while maintaining its contribution amount for MIGA and the IBRD. Canada has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported several World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions

across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Canada receives a score of 0.

China: +1

China has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for China Jiandi Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁵¹¹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁵¹² This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 8 December 2024, China agreed to a plan to replenish the China-World Bank Group Partnership Facility (CWPF) for USD50 million.⁵¹³ The CWPF is a partnership between China's Ministry of Finance and the World Bank Group, with its overall objective being to assist World Bank Group recipient countries with sustainable development and economic growth.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁵¹⁴ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁵¹⁵ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh,

India.⁵¹⁶ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁵¹⁷ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁵¹⁸ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁵¹⁹ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁵²⁰

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁵²¹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁵²² The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or

strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁵²³ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁵²⁴

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁵²⁵ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁵²⁶ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁵²⁷

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁵²⁸ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁵²⁹ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in

Pakistan.⁵³⁰ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan’s new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁵³¹ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and “a human resource certification system.”

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁵³² This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany’s KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh’s project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁵³³ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁵³⁴ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal’s bridge systems project.⁵³⁵ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁵³⁶ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Deputy Director

General at the Center for Evaluation of the World Bank Loan Projects in the Ministry of Finance Zhang Bo and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁵³⁷

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Fo'an Lan and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁵³⁸ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that China will contribute CNY10,835.76 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from China's pledge of CNY1,636.04 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁵³⁹

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁵⁴⁰ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁵⁴¹

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁵⁴²

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁵⁴³ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁵⁴⁴

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁵⁴⁵

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁵⁴⁶ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁵⁴⁷

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁵⁴⁸

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Weifeng Yang and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁵⁴⁹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁵⁵⁰ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Ye and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁵⁵¹ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that China has a total subscription amount of USD739,505,000.⁵⁵² This marks an increase from China’s subscription amount of USD671,360,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁵⁵³

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that China has a total subscription amount of SDR55.3 million.⁵⁵⁴ This amount is the same as China’s subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment’s goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁵⁵⁵

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group’s Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁵⁵⁶ The data reveals that China increased its contribution to the World Bank’s trust funds from USD23,870,961 in fiscal year 2024 to USD44,808,693 in fiscal year 2025, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that China has a total subscription amount of USD16,685.9 million (in 1944 currency).⁵⁵⁷ This amount is the same as China’s subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment’s goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁵⁵⁸

China has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. China has participated in World Bank meetings to provide

concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. China has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21, the IFC and the World Bank's trust funds, including a USD50 million contribution to the China-World Bank Group Partnership Facility. China has also maintained its contribution amount for MIGA and the IBRD and mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives.

Thus, China receives a score of +1.

France: +1

France has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for France Arnaud Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁵⁵⁹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁵⁶⁰ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Human Development at the Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs Clarisse Paolini and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.⁵⁶¹ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster

and climate preparedness.⁵⁶² This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁵⁶³ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁵⁶⁴ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁵⁶⁵ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁵⁶⁶ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁵⁶⁷ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁵⁶⁸

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of

Tanzania.”⁵⁶⁹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office’s Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank’s Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁵⁷⁰ The changes aim to improve the independence, “effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process” through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment’s focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁵⁷¹ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁵⁷²

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁵⁷³ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁵⁷⁴ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁵⁷⁵

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁵⁷⁶ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 February 2025, President Emmanuel Macron promulgated Law No. 2025-127, also known as the Finance Act for 2025. Article 165 of the Act authorizes the Ministry of Economy to provide a EUR300 million guarantee to the IDA, covering principal, interest and other charges for its loans and grants.⁵⁷⁷ This allocation is subject to an agreement between the IDA and France regarding the terms and conditions of the guarantee.

On 27 February 2025, France's representative Pierre Marc and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁵⁷⁸ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁵⁷⁹ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁵⁸⁰ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁵⁸¹ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁵⁸² This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁵⁸³ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁵⁸⁴ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁵⁸⁵ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁵⁸⁶ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Senior Advisor for Climate and Environment Stephane Cieniewski and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁵⁸⁷

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Economy, Finance and Industrial and Digital Sovereignty Eric Lombard and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁵⁸⁸ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that France will contribute EUR1,170 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. France will also provide a

EUR300 million portfolio guarantee for IDA21. In sum, this marks an increase from France's pledge of EUR1,457.21 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁵⁸⁹

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁵⁹⁰ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁵⁹¹

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁵⁹²

On 24 April 2025, Minister Lombard spoke at the World Bank Development Committee's 111th Meeting, confirming that France will contribute EUR1,170 million to IDA21 alongside a EUR300 million portfolio guarantee.⁵⁹³ Minister Lombard shared that France is the first country to announce its portfolio guarantee contribution for the IDA and encouraged other members to follow suit.

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁵⁹⁴ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁵⁹⁵

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁵⁹⁶

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁵⁹⁷ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁵⁹⁸

On 13 May 2025, Proparco and the IFC announced EUR32.6 million in co-financing for Groupe Duval's project to build retail, office and living spaces in Village Notre Père, Côte d'Ivoire.⁵⁹⁹ This will support economic growth and the development of Côte d'Ivoire's business and tourism sectors.

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁶⁰⁰

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Buissé Camille Fabre and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁶⁰¹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Buissé of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁶⁰² This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Buissé and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁶⁰³ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that France has a total subscription amount of USD1,184,438,000.⁶⁰⁴ This marks an increase from France's subscription amount of USD1,132,088,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶⁰⁵

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that France has a total subscription amount of SDR85.65 million.⁶⁰⁶ This amount is the same as France's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶⁰⁷

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁶⁰⁸ The data reveals that France increased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD737,050,435 in fiscal year 2024 to USD808,238,094 in fiscal year 2025, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank. This contribution includes funding from the French National Research Institute for Agriculture, Food and Environment.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that France has a total subscription amount of USD10,861.1 million (in 1944

currency).⁶⁰⁹ This amount is the same as France's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶¹⁰

France has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. France has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. France has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21, the IFC and the World Bank's trust funds, while maintaining its contribution amount for MIGA and the IBRD. France has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's CTF Committee which has supported World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects.

Thus, France receives a score of +1.

Germany: 0

Germany has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Germany Michael Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁶¹¹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 1 December 2024, Head of Division 122 for Agriculture and Rural Development at the Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development Jens Busma and the IBRD's Director of Trust Funds and Partner Relations Maitreyi B Das amended a contribution agreement between Germany and the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research Trust Fund from 29 November 2023.⁶¹² The amendment includes a supplemental contribution agreement whereby Germany will provide an additional EUR25 million to the trust fund. EUR15 million of this amount was deposited at the time of signing, with EUR3.5 million to be

deposited by 31 October 2025. On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁶¹³ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Senior Policy Officer at the Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development Alexandra Rudolph-Seemann and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.⁶¹⁴ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁶¹⁵ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁶¹⁶ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁶¹⁷ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁶¹⁸ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁶¹⁹ This will support sustainable economic development

on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁶²⁰ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁶²¹

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁶²² The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁶²³ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁶²⁴ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁶²⁵

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁶²⁶ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁶²⁷ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁶²⁸

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁶²⁹ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment’s focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, Germany’s representative Laura Schmidt and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)’s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁶³⁰ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD’s offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)’s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank’s capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, representative Schmidt and the CIF’s Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁶³¹ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank’s project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank’s capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁶³² This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁶³³ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁶³⁴ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁶³⁵ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁶³⁶ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁶³⁷ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁶³⁸ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁶³⁹ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Head of the Climate Finance Division at the Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development Annette Windmeisser and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁶⁴⁰

On 15 April 2025, Minister for Economic Cooperation and Development Svenja Schulze and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁶⁴¹ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Germany will contribute EUR1,617.93 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This contribution is the same as Germany's pledge for IDA20, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the IDA.⁶⁴²

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁶⁴³ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁶⁴⁴

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate

agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁶⁴⁵

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁶⁴⁶ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁶⁴⁷

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁶⁴⁸

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁶⁴⁹ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁶⁵⁰

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁶⁵¹

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Sandro Maluck and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁶⁵² Between 14

May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁶⁵³ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Krake and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁶⁵⁴ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Germany has a total subscription amount of USD1,261,691,000.⁶⁵⁵ This amount is the same as Germany’s subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment’s goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶⁵⁶

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Germany has a total subscription amount of SDR89.36 million.⁶⁵⁷ This amount is the same as Germany’s subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment’s goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶⁵⁸

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group’s Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁶⁵⁹ The data reveals that Germany decreased its contribution to the World Bank’s trust funds from USD1,147,928,944 in fiscal year 2024 to USD1,571,737,025 in fiscal year 2025, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank. This includes EUR25 million for the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research Trust Fund, as announced on 1 December 2024.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Germany has a total subscription amount of USD11,857.8 million (in 1944 currency).⁶⁶⁰ This amount is the same as Germany's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁶⁶¹

Germany has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Germany has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Germany has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to the World Bank's trust funds and the IDA through its 21st replenishment and co-financing through the KfW Development Bank, while maintaining its contribution amount for the IFC, MIGA and the IBRD. Germany has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported several World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Germany receives a score of 0.

India: +1

India has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for India, Bangladesh, Bhutan and Sri Lanka Parameswaran Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁶⁶² This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁶⁶³ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁶⁶⁴ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁶⁶⁵ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁶⁶⁶ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁶⁶⁷ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁶⁶⁸ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁶⁶⁹ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed

by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁶⁷⁰

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁶⁷¹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁶⁷² The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁶⁷³ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁶⁷⁴

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.⁶⁷⁵ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁶⁷⁶ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as

well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁶⁷⁷

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁶⁷⁸ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, India's representative Hemang Priyavadan Jani and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁶⁷⁹ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁶⁸⁰ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁶⁸¹ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁶⁸² This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁶⁸³ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁶⁸⁴ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁶⁸⁵ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁶⁸⁶ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁶⁸⁷ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. India's representative at the Global Environmental Facility Iyer and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁶⁸⁸

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Nirmala Sitharaman and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁶⁸⁹ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that India will contribute INR23,210.83 million to IDA21 between 1

July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from India's pledge of INR17,480.00 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁶⁹⁰

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁶⁹¹ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁶⁹²

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁶⁹³

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁶⁹⁴ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁶⁹⁵

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁶⁹⁶

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁶⁹⁷ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁶⁹⁸

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁶⁹⁹

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Sharifa Khan and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁷⁰⁰ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁷⁰¹ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Iyer and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁷⁰² This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that India has a total subscription amount of USD1,007,597,000.⁷⁰³ This marks an increase in India's subscription amount of USD963,064,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁰⁴

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that India has a total subscription amount of SDR53.71 million.⁷⁰⁵ This amount is the same as India's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁰⁶

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁷⁰⁷ The data reveals that India increased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD10,291,771 in fiscal year 2024 to USD21,506,465 in fiscal year 2025.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that India has a total subscription amount of USD8,517.5 million (in 1944 currency).⁷⁰⁸ This amount is the same as India's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁰⁹

India has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. India has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. India has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions to IDA21, the IFC and the World Bank's trust funds, while maintaining its contribution amount for MIGA and the IBRD. India has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed

initiatives through the CIF's CTF Committee which has supported several World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects.

Thus, India receives a score of +1.

Indonesia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Indonesia and other Southeast Asian members Wempi Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁷¹⁰ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁷¹¹ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁷¹² This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁷¹³ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar

Pradesh, India.⁷¹⁴ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁷¹⁵ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁷¹⁶ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁷¹⁷ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁷¹⁸

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁷¹⁹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁷²⁰ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus

on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁷²¹ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁷²²

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁷²³ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁷²⁴ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁷²⁵

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁷²⁶ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment’s focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁷²⁷ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA’s Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the

sector in Pakistan.⁷²⁸ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁷²⁹ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁷³⁰ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁷³¹ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁷³² This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁷³³ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁷³⁴ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Deputy

Director General at the Ministry of Environment Navann Ouk and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁷³⁵

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Sri Mulyani Indrawati and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁷³⁶ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Indonesia will contribute USD30 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This contribution is the same as Indonesia's pledge for IDA20, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the IDA.⁷³⁷

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁷³⁸ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁷³⁹

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁷⁴⁰

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁷⁴¹ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁷⁴²

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁷⁴³

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁷⁴⁴ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁷⁴⁵

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁷⁴⁶

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Saputra Ilaisaane Lolo and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁷⁴⁷ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁷⁴⁸ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Saputra and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁷⁴⁹ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Indonesia has a total subscription amount of USD309,305,000.⁷⁵⁰ This amount is the same as Indonesia's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁵¹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Indonesia has a total subscription amount of SDR18.49 million.⁷⁵² This amount is the same as Indonesia's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁵³

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁷⁵⁴ The data reveals that Indonesia decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD25,005,581 in fiscal year 2024 to USD10,000,000 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Indonesia has a total subscription amount of USD2,886.3 million (in 1944 currency).⁷⁵⁵ This amount is the same as Indonesia's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁷⁵⁶

Indonesia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help

in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Indonesia has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Indonesia has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity by maintaining its contributions for the IDA, IFC, IBRD and MIGA. Indonesia has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Indonesia receives a score of 0.

Italy: +1

Italy has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Italy, Albania, Greece, Malta, Portugal, San Marino and Timor-Leste Matteo Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁷⁵⁷ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁷⁵⁸ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Italy's representative Ryo Nakamura and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.⁷⁵⁹ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster

and climate preparedness.⁷⁶⁰ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁷⁶¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁷⁶² Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁷⁶³ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁷⁶⁴ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁷⁶⁵ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁷⁶⁶

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of

Tanzania.”⁷⁶⁷ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office’s Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank’s Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁷⁶⁸ The changes aim to improve the independence, “effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process” through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment’s focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁷⁶⁹ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁷⁷⁰

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁷⁷¹ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁷⁷² The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁷⁷³

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁷⁷⁴ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 28 February 2025, Deputy Director at the Global Public Goods Office of the International Financial Relations Directorate Gisella Berardi and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁷⁷⁵ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁷⁷⁶ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁷⁷⁷ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁷⁷⁸ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁷⁷⁹ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁷⁸⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁷⁸¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁷⁸² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁷⁸³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Deputy Director at the Global Public Goods Office in the International Financial Relations Directorate Gisella Berardi and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁷⁸⁴

On 15 April 2025, Governor of the Bank of Italy Fabio Panetta and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁷⁸⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Italy will contribute EUR733 million to IDA21 between 1 July

2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from Italy's pledge of EUR591.39 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁷⁸⁶

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁷⁸⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁷⁸⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁷⁸⁹

On 24 April 2025, Italy signed a co-financing agreement with the World Bank to advance its Mattei Plan for Africa which aims to support energy transition, infrastructure, employment and other developmental challenges in Africa.⁷⁹⁰ The World Bank also shared that Italy is increasing its financing for the IDA by 25 per cent for the 21st replenishment and will be increasing its contribution to the IBRD through this agreement.

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁷⁹¹ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁷⁹²

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁷⁹³

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁷⁹⁴ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁷⁹⁵

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁷⁹⁶

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Miguel Coelho and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁷⁹⁷ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁷⁹⁸ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Bugamelli and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance

sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁷⁹⁹ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Italy has a total subscription amount of USD796,137,000.⁸⁰⁰ This marks an increase from Italy's subscription amount of USD760,950,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁸⁰¹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Italy has a total subscription amount of SDR49.7 million.⁸⁰² This amount is the same as Italy's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁸⁰³

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁸⁰⁴ The data reveals that Italy decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD152,156,675 in fiscal year 2024 to USD146,838,537 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Italy has a total subscription amount of USD7,614.4 million (in 1944 currency).⁸⁰⁵ This is an increase from its total subscription amount from 17 May 2024, which was of USD7,244.4 million (in 1944 currency).⁸⁰⁶ Therefore, Italy has mobilized more headroom finance for the IBRD.

Italy has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Italy has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan.

This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Italy has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for IDA21, the IFC and the IBRD, while maintaining its contribution to MIGA. Italy has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF Committee which has supported World Bank projects.

Thus, Italy receives a score of +1.

Japan: 0

Japan has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Japan Hideaki Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁸⁰⁷ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁸⁰⁸ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁸⁰⁹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁸¹⁰ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar

Pradesh, India.⁸¹¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁸¹² This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁸¹³ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁸¹⁴ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁸¹⁵

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁸¹⁶ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁸¹⁷ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus

on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁸¹⁸ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁸¹⁹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁸²⁰ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁸²¹ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁸²²

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁸²³ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, Director for Climate Change and Environmental Issues at the Ministry of Finance Tsuyoshi Hyokai and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.⁸²⁴ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Director Hyokai and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁸²⁵ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁸²⁶ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁸²⁷ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁸²⁸ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁸²⁹ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience

for vulnerable groups.⁸³⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁸³¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁸³² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁸³³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Director Hyokai and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁸³⁴

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Katsunobu Kato and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁸³⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Japan will contribute JPY425,700 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from Japan's pledge of JPY376,743.34 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁸³⁶ On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁸³⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁸³⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁸³⁹

On 24 April 2025, Minister Kato spoke at the World Bank Development Committee's 111th Meeting, noting that Japan's JPY425,700 million contribution to IDA21 was approved on 11 April 2025.⁸⁴⁰ Minister Kato also announced a USD500 million credit enhancement for the IBRD for 2025, a USD3 million contribution for the World Bank, Japan and World Health Organization's Universal Health Coverage Knowledge Hub, a USD16 million contribution for Phase Four of the Universal Health Coverage Program and USD30 million from the Japan Policy and Human Resources Development Fund for the World Bank's "activities for food and nutrition security in Africa." These contributions support the mobilization of more headroom finance for the World Bank, including the IDA, IBRD and trust funds.

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁸⁴¹ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁸⁴²

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁸⁴³

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁸⁴⁴ The Moldova Supporting Economic

Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova’s economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁸⁴⁵

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh’s recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country’s resilience to future disasters.⁸⁴⁶

On 15 May 2025, the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors, of which Japan is a part, approved a USD350 million grant from the IDA to support Malawi’s Mpatamanga Hydropower Storage Project to transform the country’s energy sector and promote economic growth.⁸⁴⁷

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Imamura Soya Otani and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁸⁴⁸ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁸⁴⁹ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Imamura and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁸⁵⁰ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Japan has a total subscription amount of USD1,800,442,000.⁸⁵¹ This amount is the same as Japan's subscription amount from 15 April 2024.⁸⁵²

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Japan has a total subscription amount of SDR89.79 million.⁸⁵³ This amount is the same as Japan's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁸⁵⁴

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁸⁵⁵ The data reveals that Japan decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD1,156,556,651 in fiscal year 2024 to USD810,705,566 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Japan has a total subscription amount of USD19,988.5 million (in 1944 currency).⁸⁵⁶ This amount is the same as Japan subscription amount from 17 May 2024.⁸⁵⁷ This does not include the USD500 million credit enhancement announced on 24 April 2025.

Japan has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Japan has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Japan has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for IDA21 and the IBRD through subscriptions and a credit enhancement, while maintaining its contributions to the IFC and MIGA. Japan has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank

initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported several World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Japan receives a score of 0.

Korea: 0

Korea has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 25 November 2024, the Ministry of Economy and Finance announced a USD7 million contribution to the Green Climate Fund's new Loss and Damage Fund during the COP29 conference in Baku.⁸⁵⁸ The funding will help developing countries cope with climate-related disasters, such as rising sea levels and extreme weather events. The Green Climate Fund is one of the World Bank's financial intermediary funds.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Korea, Australia and other members Robert Bruce Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁸⁵⁹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁸⁶⁰ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, Korea's representative Mark Lloyd and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.⁸⁶¹ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and International Development Association (IDA)-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁸⁶² This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁸⁶³ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁸⁶⁴ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁸⁶⁵ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁸⁶⁶ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁸⁶⁷ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁸⁶⁸

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁸⁶⁹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁸⁷⁰ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁸⁷¹ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁸⁷²

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.⁸⁷³ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁸⁷⁴ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁸⁷⁵

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁸⁷⁶ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 28 February 2025, Korea's representative Do Ik Kim and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.⁸⁷⁷ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 10 March 2025, Director General for the Fiscal Policy Bureau at the Ministry of Economy and Finance Moonsun Jang and the IBRD and IDA's Director for Strategy and Operations Elisabeth Huybens signed an administration agreement whereby Korea will provide USD2,300,000 for the Public Expenditure Management Network in Asia Phase III Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁸⁷⁸ Of this, USD900,000 will be deposited by 30 June 2025, with the remainder in 2026-2028. On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁸⁷⁹ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁸⁸⁰ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 18 March 2025, the International Finance Corporation (IFC) and Inter-American Development Bank Invest announced a USD13.5 million investment for Solengy Haiti S.A., a solar energy company in Haiti.⁸⁸¹ Of this, USD1.5 million will be provided through the Korea Green, Resilient and Innovative Development program. This funding will support 10 megawatts-peak in solar energy and 20 megawatts-hours of energy storage, supporting energy distribution, resilience and transformation.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁸⁸² This

project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and “a human resource certification system.”

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁸⁸³ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany’s KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh’s project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁸⁸⁴ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁸⁸⁵ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal’s bridge systems project.⁸⁸⁶ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁸⁸⁷ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Korea’s representative at the Global Environmental Facility Richard Bontjer and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁸⁸⁸

On 8 April 2025, Director General for the Development Finance Bureau at the Ministry of Economy and Finance Jisung Moon and the IBRD’s Director of Trust Funds and Partner Relations Maitreyi B Das signed an agreement whereby Korea will provide USD7,000,000 for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to

Loss and Damage.⁸⁸⁹ Of this, USD2,150,000 will be deposited by 30 September 2025, with the remainder in 2026-2027.

On 15 April 2025, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Economy and Finance Sang Mok Choi and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁸⁹⁰ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Korea will contribute KRW845,600 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from Korea's pledge of KRW584,773.42 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.⁸⁹¹ Korea initially announced its contribution increase during the G20 Summit on 18 November 2024.⁸⁹²

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁸⁹³ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁸⁹⁴

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁸⁹⁵

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-

Donor Trust Fund.⁸⁹⁶ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁸⁹⁷

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁸⁹⁸

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁸⁹⁹ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁹⁰⁰

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁹⁰¹

On 15 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁹⁰² Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁹⁰³ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Nicholl and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve “climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala,” advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁹⁰⁴ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Korea has a total subscription amount of USD323,047,000.⁹⁰⁵ This marks an increase from Korea’s subscription amount of USD308,769,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹⁰⁶ This amount does not include co-financing initiatives with the IFC.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Korea has a total subscription amount of SDR7.91 million.⁹⁰⁷ This amount is the same as Korea’s subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment’s goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹⁰⁸

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group’s Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁹⁰⁹ The data reveals that Korea decreased its contribution to the World Bank’s trust funds from USD193,204,980 in fiscal year 2024 to USD144,227,171 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment’s objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank. This contribution includes USD900,000 for the Public Expenditure Management Network in Asia Phase III Multi-Donor Trust Fund and USD2,150,000 for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank’s Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Korea has a total subscription amount of USD4,528.5 million (in 1944 currency).⁹¹⁰

This amount is the same as Korea's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹¹¹

Korea has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Korea has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Korea has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for IDA21 and the IFC, while maintaining its contributions to the IBRD and MIGA. Korea has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF Committee which has supported World Bank projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Korea receives a score of 0.

Mexico: 0

Mexico has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Mexico, Spain, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua Teresa Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁹¹² This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁹¹³ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for

an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁹¹⁴ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁹¹⁵ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁹¹⁶ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁹¹⁷ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁹¹⁸ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁹¹⁹ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁹²⁰

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of

Tanzania.”⁹²¹ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office’s Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank’s Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁹²² The changes aim to improve the independence, “effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process” through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment’s focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁹²³ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁹²⁴

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.⁹²⁵ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁹²⁶ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁹²⁷

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁹²⁸ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁹²⁹ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁹³⁰ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁹³¹ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁹³² This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁹³³ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁹³⁴ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁹³⁵ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁹³⁶ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. General Director of International Fora and Sustainable Finance Ministry of Finance and Public Credit Regina Rosales Talamas and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁹³⁷

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance and Public Credit Edgar Amador Zamora and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁹³⁸ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Mexico will not contribute to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks a decrease from Mexico's pledge of USD17 million for IDA20, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹³⁹

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.⁹⁴⁰ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁹⁴¹

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁹⁴²

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁹⁴³ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁹⁴⁴

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁹⁴⁵

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁹⁴⁶ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁹⁴⁷

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁹⁴⁸

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Solbes Shanti Guardado and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁹⁴⁹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁹⁵⁰ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Solbes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁹⁵¹ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Mexico has a total subscription amount of USD232,794,000.⁹⁵² This amount is the same as Mexico's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹⁵³

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Mexico has a total subscription amount of SDR11.92 million.⁹⁵⁴ This amount is the same as Mexico's subscription amount from

30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹⁵⁵

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.⁹⁵⁶ The data reveals that Mexico decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD3,235,601 in fiscal year 2024 to USD2,607,519 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Mexico has a total subscription amount of USD4,772 million (in 1944 currency).⁹⁵⁷ This is an increase in its total subscription amount from 17 May 2024, which was USD4,011.9 million (in 1944 currency).⁹⁵⁸ Therefore, Mexico has mobilized more headroom finance for the IBRD.

Mexico has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Mexico has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Mexico has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contribution for the IBRD, while maintaining its contributions to the IFC and MIGA. Mexico has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Mexico receives a score of 0.

Russia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Alternate Executive Director for Russia, Syria and Belarus Alexey Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for

Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.⁹⁵⁹ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.⁹⁶⁰ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.⁹⁶¹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.⁹⁶² Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.⁹⁶³ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.⁹⁶⁴ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.⁹⁶⁵ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.⁹⁶⁶ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.⁹⁶⁷

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."⁹⁶⁸ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.⁹⁶⁹ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.⁹⁷⁰ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.⁹⁷¹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.⁹⁷² This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.⁹⁷³ The framework will focus on

policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.⁹⁷⁴

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.⁹⁷⁵ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.⁹⁷⁶ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.⁹⁷⁷ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.⁹⁷⁸ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.⁹⁷⁹ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary

Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.⁹⁸⁰ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.⁹⁸¹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.⁹⁸² The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.⁹⁸³ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Russia's representative at the Global Environmental Facility Ruzanna Grigoryan and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.⁹⁸⁴

On 15 April 2025, Deputy Prime Minister Alexei Logvinovich Overchuk and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).⁹⁸⁵ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that Russia will not contribute to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks a decrease from Russia's pledge of USD50 million for IDA20, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.⁹⁸⁶

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation

Universal Access Program.⁹⁸⁷ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.⁹⁸⁸

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.⁹⁸⁹

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.⁹⁹⁰ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.⁹⁹¹

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.⁹⁹²

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.⁹⁹³ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.⁹⁹⁴

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.⁹⁹⁵

On 15 May 2025, Senior Advisor to Executive Director Morozov Dzhanneta Medzhidova and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.⁹⁹⁶ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.⁹⁹⁷ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Morozov and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.⁹⁹⁸ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Russia has a total subscription amount of USD784,211,000.⁹⁹⁹ This amount is the same as Russia's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁰⁰

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Russia has a total subscription amount of SDR55.28 million.¹⁰⁰¹ This amount is the same as Russia's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁰²

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Russia has a total subscription amount of USD7,912.1 million (in 1944 currency).¹⁰⁰³ This amount is the same as Russia's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁰⁴

Russia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Russia has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Russia has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity by maintaining its contributions for the IFC, IBRD and MIGA. Russia has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Russia receives a score of 0.

Saudi Arabia: 0

Saudi Arabia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Saudi Arabia Suhail Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development

(IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.¹⁰⁰⁵ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.¹⁰⁰⁶ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.¹⁰⁰⁷ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.¹⁰⁰⁸ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.¹⁰⁰⁹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.¹⁰¹⁰ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.¹⁰¹¹ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹⁰¹² The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹⁰¹³

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."¹⁰¹⁴ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.¹⁰¹⁵ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.¹⁰¹⁶ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.¹⁰¹⁷

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.¹⁰¹⁸ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.¹⁰¹⁹ The framework will focus on policy

and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.¹⁰²⁰

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.¹⁰²¹ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.¹⁰²² This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.¹⁰²³ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.¹⁰²⁴ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.¹⁰²⁵ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary

Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.¹⁰²⁶ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.¹⁰²⁷ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.¹⁰²⁸ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹⁰²⁹ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. The Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.¹⁰³⁰

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Mohammed A. Al-Jadaan and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for IDA21.¹⁰³¹ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and confirms that Saudi Arabia will contribute USD700 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This contribution is the same as Saudi Arabia's pledge for IDA20, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the IDA.¹⁰³²

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal

Access Program.¹⁰³³ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.¹⁰³⁴

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.¹⁰³⁵

On 24 April 2025, Minister of Finance Mohammed Aljadaan issued a joint statement with the International Monetary Fund's Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva and President of World Bank Group Ajay Banga regarding Syria.¹⁰³⁶ They emphasized international support for Syria's stabilization, economic reforms and institutional rebuilding and called for continued coordination among global partners, with plans to assess progress by the October 2025 Annual Meetings.

On 27 April 2025, Minister Aljadaan and Qatar's Minister of Finance Ali bin Ahmed Al Kuwari jointly announced their pledge to settle Syria's USD15 million outstanding debts to the World Bank Group.¹⁰³⁷ This will enable the World Bank to resume financial and technical operations in Syria after more than fourteen years of suspension, supporting its development.¹⁰³⁸

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹⁰³⁹ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.¹⁰⁴⁰

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.¹⁰⁴¹

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.¹⁰⁴² The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.¹⁰⁴³

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.¹⁰⁴⁴

On 15 May 2025, Advisor to Executive Director Saeed Rafan Alfrayyan and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.¹⁰⁴⁵ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.¹⁰⁴⁶ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Saeed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.¹⁰⁴⁷ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the International Finance Corporation (IFC), noting that Saudi Arabia has a total subscription amount of USD583,805,000.¹⁰⁴⁸ This marks an increase from Saudi Arabia's subscription amount of USD551,552,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁴⁹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Saudi Arabia has a total subscription amount of SDR55.28 million.¹⁰⁵⁰ This amount is the same as Saudi Arabia's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁵¹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹⁰⁵² The data reveals that Saudi Arabia decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD55,972,180 in fiscal year 2024 to USD10,000,000 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Saudi Arabia has a total subscription amount of USD7,696.7 million (in 1944 currency).¹⁰⁵³ This amount is the same as Saudi Arabia's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁵⁴

Saudi Arabia has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Saudi Arabia has participated in World Bank

meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Saudi Arabia has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for the IFC and the IDA through its 21st replenishment and co-financing for Tajikistan through the Saudi Bank for Development, while maintaining its contributions to the IBRD and MIGA. However, Saudi Arabia has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Saudi Arabia receives a score of 0.

South Africa: 0

South Africa has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for South Africa, Angola and Nigeria Zainab Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.¹⁰⁵⁵ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.¹⁰⁵⁶ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.¹⁰⁵⁷ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.¹⁰⁵⁸ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.¹⁰⁵⁹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.¹⁰⁶⁰ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.¹⁰⁶¹ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹⁰⁶² The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹⁰⁶³

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."¹⁰⁶⁴ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.¹⁰⁶⁵ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive

Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.¹⁰⁶⁶ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.¹⁰⁶⁷

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.¹⁰⁶⁸ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.¹⁰⁶⁹ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.¹⁰⁷⁰

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.¹⁰⁷¹ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, Deputy Director-General of Climate Change and Air Quality Management Maesela Kekana and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.¹⁰⁷² This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the

mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Deputy Director-General Kekana and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.¹⁰⁷³ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.¹⁰⁷⁴ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.¹⁰⁷⁵ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.¹⁰⁷⁶ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.¹⁰⁷⁷ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience

for vulnerable groups.¹⁰⁷⁸ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.¹⁰⁷⁹ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.¹⁰⁸⁰ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹⁰⁸¹ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. South Africa's representative at the Global Environmental Facility Qongqong Hooхло and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.¹⁰⁸²

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Enoch Godongwana and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).¹⁰⁸³ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that South Africa will contribute ZAR227.47 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028.¹⁰⁸⁴ This marks an increase from South Africa's pledge of ZAR199.02 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.¹⁰⁸⁵ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.¹⁰⁸⁶

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.¹⁰⁸⁷

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹⁰⁸⁸ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.¹⁰⁸⁹

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.¹⁰⁹⁰

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.¹⁰⁹¹ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.¹⁰⁹²

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.¹⁰⁹³

On 15 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.¹⁰⁹⁴ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.¹⁰⁹⁵ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Ahmed and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.¹⁰⁹⁶ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that South Africa has a total subscription amount of USD132,805,000.¹⁰⁹⁷ This amount is the same as South Africa's subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹⁰⁹⁸

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that South Africa has a total subscription amount of SDR16.62 million.¹⁰⁹⁹ This amount is the same as South Africa's subscription amount

from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹¹⁰⁰

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹¹⁰¹ The data reveals that South Africa decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD5,226,760 in fiscal year 2024 to USD3,885,069 in fiscal year 2025, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that South Africa has a total subscription amount of USD2,079.3 million (in 1944 currency).¹¹⁰² This amount is the same as South Africa's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹¹⁰³

South Africa has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. South Africa has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. South Africa has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for IDA21, while maintaining its contributions to the IBRD, IFC and MIGA. South Africa has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, South Africa receives a score of 0.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for Türkiye, Austria, Belgium, Czechia, Hungary, Kosovo, Luxembourg, Slovak Republic and Slovenia Nathalie Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.¹¹⁰⁴ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.¹¹⁰⁵ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in International Development Association (IDA) credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster and climate preparedness.¹¹⁰⁶ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.¹¹⁰⁷ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.¹¹⁰⁸ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.¹¹⁰⁹ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.¹¹¹⁰ This will support sustainable economic development

on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹¹¹¹ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹¹¹²

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."¹¹¹³ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.¹¹¹⁴ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.¹¹¹⁵ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.¹¹¹⁶

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.¹¹¹⁷ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.¹¹¹⁸ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.¹¹¹⁹

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.¹¹²⁰ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, Director-General of Foreign Economic Relations at the Ministry of Treasury and Finance Kerem Donmez and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.¹¹²¹ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Director-General Donmez and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several climate-related development projects.¹¹²² This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.¹¹²³ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.¹¹²⁴ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.¹¹²⁵ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.¹¹²⁶ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for vulnerable groups.¹¹²⁷ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.¹¹²⁸ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.¹¹²⁹ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹¹³⁰ The European

Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. Türkiye's representative at the Global Environmental Facility Victoria Schreitter and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.¹¹³¹

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Treasury and Finance Mehmet Şimşek and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for IDA21.¹¹³² The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and confirms that Türkiye will contribute USD14.11 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This contribution is the same as Türkiye's pledge for IDA20, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the IDA.¹¹³³

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal Access Program.¹¹³⁴ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.¹¹³⁵

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.¹¹³⁶

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems

20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹¹³⁷ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.¹¹³⁸

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.¹¹³⁹

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.¹¹⁴⁰ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.¹¹⁴¹

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.¹¹⁴²

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Ali Ibrahim Gur and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.¹¹⁴³ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for “a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project” in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.¹¹⁴⁴ This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Francken and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.¹¹⁴⁵ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that Türkiye has a total subscription amount of USD187,498,000.¹¹⁴⁶ This marks an increase from Türkiye's subscription amount of USD146,063,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹¹⁴⁷

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that Türkiye has a total subscription amount of SDR8.14 million.¹¹⁴⁸ This amount is the same as Türkiye's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹¹⁴⁹

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹¹⁵⁰ The data reveals that Türkiye contributed USD500,000 to the World Bank's trust funds in fiscal year 2024 and fiscal year 2025, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that Türkiye has a total subscription amount of USD3,066.8 million (in 1944

currency).¹¹⁵¹ This amount is the same as Türkiye's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹¹⁵²

Türkiye has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. Türkiye has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. Türkiye has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contribution for the IFC, while maintaining its contributions to the IDA, IBRD, MIGA and World Bank's trust funds. Türkiye has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, Türkiye receives a score of 0.

United Kingdom: +1

The United Kingdom has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 21 November 2024, Director of International Climate Finance and Strategy at the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero Matt Toombs and Vice-President for Planet at the International Development Association (IDA) and International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) Juergen Voegel signed an administration agreement whereby the United Kingdom will provide GBP178,200,000 for the Scaling Climate Action by Lowering Emissions Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹¹⁵³ Of this, GBP134,120,000 will be deposited by 31 December 2024, GBP11,205,000 by 31 March 2025 and GBP32,875,000 by 31 December 2025.

On 25 November 2024, the International Finance Corporation (IFC) announced USD605 million in financing for development projects in Egypt, focusing on the climate, sustainable tourism and micro, small,

and medium-sized enterprises.¹¹⁵⁴ As part of this investment, British International Investment will contribute USD100 million towards a USD300 million sustainability bond from the Arab African International Bank aimed at supporting “green financing, including industrial energy-efficiency, small-scale renewable energy projects and green buildings.”

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for the United Kingdom Vel Gnanendran and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in IBRD funding for Morocco’s solid waste management project.¹¹⁵⁵ This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 28 November 2024, the United Kingdom pledged GBP1.98 billion to the IDA as part of its 21st replenishment (IDA21).¹¹⁵⁶ The funding will provide grants and interest-free loans for poverty reduction, climate adaptation and economic development in the poorest and low-income countries.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra’s development.¹¹⁵⁷ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, the United Kingdom’s representative Ruth Lawson and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.¹¹⁵⁸ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and IDA-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan’s disaster and climate preparedness.¹¹⁵⁹ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.¹¹⁶⁰ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.¹¹⁶¹ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.¹¹⁶² This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.¹¹⁶³ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 14 December 2024, the United Kingdom signed a USD2 billion contribution agreement for the Green Climate Fund's second replenishment.¹¹⁶⁴ The funding will support climate mitigation and adaptation projects in developing countries through concessional finance. The Green Climate Fund is one of the World Bank's financial intermediary funds.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹¹⁶⁵ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹¹⁶⁶

On 18 December 2024, Director for Trust Funds and Partner Relations Maitreyi B Das, Director of International Biodiversity and Climate at the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Andrea Ledward and Commercial Lead at the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Simon

Desborough signed a notice of additional contribution.¹¹⁶⁷ The notice states that the United Kingdom will contribute an additional GBP40,000,000 to the Global Biodiversity Framework Fund. GBP32,500,000 of this will be deposited by 31 December 2024 and the remainder will be deposited by 31 December 2025.

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."¹¹⁶⁸ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank's Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.¹¹⁶⁹ The changes aim to improve the independence, "effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process" through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment's focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.¹¹⁷⁰ This will support "education, health and social protection services" in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.¹¹⁷¹

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the "Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project" in Lebanon.¹¹⁷² This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.¹¹⁷³ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of

sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.¹¹⁷⁴

On 23 January 2025, Strategy and Evidence Team Leader at the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office Eleanor Weavis and Vice President of the Prosperity Vice Presidency at the IBRD and IDA Pablo Saavedra signed an administration agreement whereby the United Kingdom will provide GBP3,500,000 for the Umbrella Facility for Trade Multi-Donor Trust Fund 2.0.¹¹⁷⁵ This funding will be deposited in installments, with GBP1,250,000 to be deposited by 30 June 2025, GBP250,000 to be deposited by 1 December 2025 and the remainder to be deposited between 2026-2029. On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.¹¹⁷⁶ The co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 13 February 2025, Deputy Director of the International Climate Finance Portfolio and Strategy at the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero Julia Ellis and Director Das signed an agreement whereby the United Kingdom will provide GBP20 million for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage.¹¹⁷⁷ Of this, GBP10 million will be deposited by 31 March 2025 and the remainder will be deposited by 31 August 2025.

On 27 February 2025, Co-Chair of the Clean Technology Fund Trust Fund Committee and Deputy Director at the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero Edward Webber and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.¹¹⁷⁸ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the IFC's battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 28 February 2025, Senior Advisor at the Climate Funds and Institutions Department Jan Wimaladharma and the CIF's Strategic Climate Fund (SCF) Committee approved financing for several

climate-related development projects.¹¹⁷⁹ This includes USD35.66 million in co-financing for the World Bank and African Development Bank's project for regenerative agriculture and ecosystems in Kenya. The SCF Committee also approved USD60.35 million in co-financing for a land use planning, biodiversity and forest restoration project in Namibia, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia, with the World Bank and African Development Bank co-financing. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. It is also expected to result in significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.¹¹⁸⁰ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.¹¹⁸¹ This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.¹¹⁸² This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.¹¹⁸³ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience

for vulnerable groups.¹¹⁸⁴ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.¹¹⁸⁵ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.¹¹⁸⁶ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹¹⁸⁷ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. The United Kingdom's Senior Responsible Officer for the Global Environmental Facility Ben Green and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.¹¹⁸⁸

On 15 April 2025, Minister of Finance Enoch Godongwana and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for IDA21.¹¹⁸⁹ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that the United Kingdom will contribute GBP1,980 million to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks an increase from the UK's pledge of GBP1,414 million for IDA20, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the IDA.¹¹⁹⁰

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation

Universal Access Program.¹¹⁹¹ This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.¹¹⁹²

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.¹¹⁹³

On 28 April 2025, British International Investment, the IFC and MetLife announced a USD60 million investment for a "local currency green bond issuance by NMB Bank."¹¹⁹⁴ The bond will support climate finance for small and medium sized enterprises in Nepal, advancing the net zero transition in the country.

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹¹⁹⁵ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.¹¹⁹⁶

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.¹¹⁹⁷

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.¹¹⁹⁸ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.¹¹⁹⁹

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.¹²⁰⁰

On 15 May 2025, Alternate Executive Director Robin Tasker and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.¹²⁰¹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.¹²⁰² This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Gnanendran and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.¹²⁰³ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that the United Kingdom has a total subscription amount of

USD1,184,438,000.¹²⁰⁴ This marks an increase from the United Kingdom's subscription amount of USD1,132,088,000 from 15 April 2024, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²⁰⁵

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that the United Kingdom has a total subscription amount of SDR85.65 million.¹²⁰⁶ This amount is the same as the United Kingdom's subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²⁰⁷

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹²⁰⁸ The data reveals that the United Kingdom increased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD1,298,713,118 in fiscal year 2024 to USD1,680,120,541 in fiscal year 2025, thereby mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank. This contribution includes GBP145,325,000 for the Scaling Climate Action by Lowering Emissions Multi-Donor Trust Fund, GBP1,250,000 for the Umbrella Facility for Trade Multi-Donor Trust Fund 2.0 and GBP10,000,000 for the Trust Fund for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that the United Kingdom has a total subscription amount of USD10,861.1 million (in 1944 currency).¹²⁰⁹ This amount is the same as the United Kingdom's subscription amount from 17 May 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²¹⁰

The United Kingdom has fully complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. The United Kingdom has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. The United Kingdom has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for IDA21, the IFC and the World Bank's trust funds, while

maintaining its contributions to the IBRD and MIGA. The United Kingdom has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's SCF and CTF Committees which have supported World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects.

Thus, the United Kingdom receives a score of +1.

United States: 0

The United States has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 19 November 2024, President Joe Biden announced that the United States will pledge USD4 billion over the next three years to the International Development Association (IDA)'s 21st replenishment (IDA21).¹²¹¹ President Biden noted that the US is the largest donor to the IDA and reaffirmed his support for the Association's mandate to support developing countries. This announcement was made prior to the start of the 2025 Rio Cycle compliance period on 20 November 2024 but contains a multiyear contribution that would be partially allocated within the compliance period.

On 26 November 2024, Executive Director for the United States Peter Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD250 million in International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) funding for Morocco's solid waste management project.¹²¹² This will support improved waste management, governance and sustainability including compliance with the Paris Agreement.

On 3 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD188.28 million in funding through the IBRD to support Maharashtra's development.¹²¹³ This will help address economic and gender disparities and stimulate growth in the Indian state.

On 5 December 2024, the United States' representative Mark Lloyd and the Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Board approved changes to support the sustainability of immunization programmes.¹²¹⁴ This includes updating its eligibility and co-financing model to ensure targeted support measures and support lower middle income and IDA-recipient countries.

On 11 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD20 million in IDA credit and USD20 million in for an IDA grant to support Bhutan's disaster

and climate preparedness.¹²¹⁵ This will support new hydropower projects, early warning systems and increased resilience.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD240 million for a second water and sewerage project in Karachi, Pakistan.¹²¹⁶ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve water, sanitation and hygiene services in the city.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD325.10 million for a project to support climate-resilient agriculture and farmers in Uttar Pradesh, India.¹²¹⁷ Funded through the IBRD, this project aims to improve value chains, access to finance and encourage private investment. France will also financially support this initiative.

On 12 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD100 million in IDA credit for Nepal's second development policy operation.¹²¹⁸ This will support environmental resilience, sustainability and development.

On 13 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD110 million IDA credit for Kiribati.¹²¹⁹ This will support sustainable economic development on the island through improving infrastructure, including enhancing climate resilience and emergency preparedness and response.

On 17 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹²²⁰ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹²²¹

On 19 December 2024, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of

Tanzania.”¹²²² The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office’s Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 8 January 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved changes to the World Bank’s Accountability Mechanism which a framework to address complaints and disputes associated with World Bank projects and funding.¹²²³ The changes aim to improve the independence, “effectiveness, efficiency and functioning of the accountability process” through the creation of two separate independent units for complaints and dispute resolution services and a new Executive Secretary position to support the Accountability Mechanism. This action supports the commitment’s focus on developing or strengthening frameworks to fairly allocate concessional financing by ensuring that World Bank projects are fair and equitable.

On 9 January 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a USD20 million IDA credit for Guinea-Bissau.¹²²⁴ This will support “education, health and social protection services” in the country with a focus on vulnerable individuals including pregnant women, children and disadvantaged groups.¹²²⁵

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved USD257.8 million in financing for the “Second Greater Beirut Water Supply Project” in Lebanon.¹²²⁶ This project will support critical water infrastructure and long-term stability.

On 14 January 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Pakistan for 2026-2039.¹²²⁷ The framework will focus on policy and institutional reforms to enable additional financing for developmental projects across a variety of sectors as well as increasing joint financing and private sector investment. The framework aims to enhance credibility and ensure the appropriate allocation of resources through long-term plans for sustainable development.¹²²⁸

On 28 January 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank’s Board of Executive Directors approved a Full Mutual Reliance Framework between the World Bank and Asian Development Bank.¹²²⁹ The

co-financing framework is focused on increasing efficiency, leveraging capacities, cost-savings and simplification by designating one institution as the main lender for the project cycle. This action advances the commitment's focus on establishing a clear framework that ensures policy cohesion between both banks for the allocation of scarce concessional resources.

On 27 February 2025, The United States' representative Abigail Demopulos and the Climate Investment Fund (CIF)'s Clean Technology Fund (CTF) Committee approved USD65 million for concessional finance and USD5 million grants for the India Investment Plan.¹²³⁰ This includes USD23 million in lending and USD1,904,762 in grant co-financing for the IBRD's offshore wind and grid strengthening projects and USD9 million in lending and USD650,000 in grant co-financing for the International Financial Corporation (IFC)'s battery storage system project. This approval marks the mobilization of headroom finance to increase World Bank's capacity to address global challenges. This project is also expected to generate significant private sector investment.

On 14 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD31 million IDA project for Djibouti.¹²³¹ This project will focus on supporting vulnerable groups, advancing socioeconomic development and increasing social safety nets. USD9 million in funding will be provided through the IDA's Window for Host Communities and Refugees.

On 18 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD102 million in IDA credit for a project to increase access to microcredit and resilience of the sector in Pakistan.¹²³² This will include the development of risk management frameworks, capacity building and innovative solutions. This project falls under Pakistan's new Country Partnership Framework. It will be co-financed by a USD23 million grant from the Global Shield Financing Facility which is financed by Canada, Germany, Japan, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom.

On 21 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD67.34 million in IDA credit for a project to improve the civil service in the Philippines.¹²³³ This project aims to accelerate development by improving public institutions through career development and training, better management and "a human resource certification system."

On 24 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD11.45 million for a project to improve the primary healthcare system in the Kyrgyz Republic.¹²³⁴ This project will support better access, diagnostics and treatment and the inclusion of information technology in healthcare to improve its quality. Of this, USD2.4 million will be provided by the Kyrgyz Republic Primary Health Care Quality Improvement Program Multi-Donor Trust Fund and the Accompanying Measures Single-Donor Trust Fund which is financed by Germany's KfW Development Bank.

On 26 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD200 million IDA credit for Bangladesh's project to improve social protection and resilience for

vulnerable groups.¹²³⁵ This includes a focus on strengthening cash transfers, social protection delivery systems, support services including skills training and monitoring and registrations.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD300 million IDA credit for Pakistan.¹²³⁶ This will support a program to improve air quality and address smog and air pollution in the province of Punjab.

On 28 March 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD150 million IDA credit for Nepal's bridge systems project.¹²³⁷ The project aims to improve bridge infrastructure to ensure resilience and connectivity across the country, given its rough terrain.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹²³⁸ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea. The United States' representative at the Global Environmental Facility Abigail Demopoulos and the Global Environmental Facility Council also approved USD10.092 million in co-financing for this project.¹²³⁹

On 15 April 2025, Under Secretary for International Affairs at the Department of the Treasury Michael Kaplan and the IDA's Board of Governors adopted resolution 255, approving a report authorizing additional contributions and guarantees for the IDA's 21st replenishment (IDA21).¹²⁴⁰ The report was adopted as approved by the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors on 17 March 2025 and notes that the United States will not contribute to IDA21 between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2028. This marks a decrease from the United States' pledge of USD3,500 million for IDA20, thereby constituting an action that is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²⁴¹ This action is also contrary to President Biden's announcement at the 2024 G20 Summit that the US would pledge USD4 billion to IDA21.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD121 million in IDA for the first phase of the Kyrgyz Republic Water Supply and Sanitation Universal

Access Program.¹²⁴² This funding package includes a USD50 million line of credit co-financed by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank.

On 18 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD120 million to develop a sustainable finance market for micro, small and medium sized enterprises in Kyrgyzstan.¹²⁴³

On 19 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD50 million grant for the second phase of Haiti's Resilient Landscape Project which aims to integrate agriculture, environmental conservation and water management to improve food security, boost livelihoods and build climate resilience in Haiti.¹²⁴⁴

On 29 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved USD125.94 million in funding for Ghana in IDA credits and grants through the Food Systems 20230 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹²⁴⁵ This will support the second phase of the West Africa Food System Resilience Program to help the country recover from climate-related agricultural losses and build a more resilient food system.

On 30 April 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved two IDA financings worth USD180.7 million to support land tenure security and integrated forest management in Benin.¹²⁴⁶

On 1 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for Bhutan for FY2025–29 and approved USD300 million in financing to enhance regional trade and connectivity.¹²⁴⁷

On 8 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD90 million Development Policy Operation for Moldova.¹²⁴⁸ The Moldova Supporting Economic Opportunities and Climate Transition operation aims to strengthen Moldova's economic growth prospects and energy security, while supporting alignment with EU standards.

On 12 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved the Eswatini Youth Employment Opportunities Project, aimed at expanding income-generating opportunities for youth in Eswatini, financed by the IDA.¹²⁴⁹

On 14 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner abstained from the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors vote to approve USD270 million to support Bangladesh's recovery from the devastating August 2024 floods and to strengthen the country's resilience to future disasters.¹²⁵⁰

On 15 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner abstained from the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors vote to approve USD350 million for a project to improve hydropower storage in Malawi.¹²⁵¹ Between 14 May and 15 May 2025, the Executive Directors of the IBRD and IDA, with Executive Director Wisner abstaining, also approved a USD12 million grant for a climate resilience and disaster preparedness project in Tonga, USD270 million IDA credit for disaster resilience, recovery and preparedness in Bangladesh, USD100 million credit to improve electricity distribution in Uzbekistan, USD35 million credit for sustainable development in Uzbekistan and USD200 million for "a National Irrigation and Energy Efficiency Improvement Project" in Uzbekistan.

On 22 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors endorsed a new Country Partnership Framework for the Philippines for 2026-2031.¹²⁵² This framework aims to support development across various sectors including health, education and jobs.

On 30 May 2025, Executive Director Wisner and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a new project in Cameroon to improve "climate-resilient urban infrastructure in Yaounde and Douala," advance sustainable development and improve land administration services.¹²⁵³ This will support sustainable development in cities in Cameroon.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IFC, noting that the United States has a total subscription amount of USD4,341,278,000.¹²⁵⁴ This amount is the same as the United States' subscription amount from 15 April 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²⁵⁵

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), noting that the United States has a total subscription amount of SDR1,039.59 million.¹²⁵⁶ This amount is the same as the United States' subscription amount from 30 June 2024, thereby partially complying with the commitment's goal to mobilize more headroom finance for the World Bank.¹²⁵⁷

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹²⁵⁸ The data reveals that the United States increased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD3,322,656,227 in fiscal year 2024 to USD28,868,243,420 in fiscal year 2025.

On 1 July 2025, the World Bank's Corporate Secretariat released subscriptions and voting power information for the IBRD, noting that the United States has a total subscription amount of USD45,196.80 million (in 1944 currency).¹²⁵⁹ This is an increase in its total subscription amount from 17 May 2024, which was USD43,847.5 million (in 1944 currency).¹²⁶⁰ Therefore, the United States has mobilized more headroom finance for the IBRD.

The United States has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. The United States has participated in World Bank meetings to provide concessional finance to low- and middle-income countries including Bangladesh, Eswatini, Benin and Bhutan. This funding, provided as credits and grants, will address several development challenges in these countries. The United States has also advanced a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources through the World Bank Board of Executive Directors' approval of the Full Mutual Reliance Framework. Additionally, it has partially mobilized more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through increased contributions for the IBRD and World Bank's trust funds, while maintaining its contributions to the IFC and MIGA. The United States has also taken action to mobilize more headroom finance to support the World Bank's capacity through the Global Environmental Facility's co-financing of World Bank initiatives and co-financed initiatives through the CIF's CTF Committee which has supported World Bank, IBRD and IFC projects. However, it has not increased its contributions across at least three of the five components of the World Bank used to assess compliance: the IDA, the IBRD, the IFC, MIGA and the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, the United States deserves a score of 0.

African Union: Not applicable

The African Union does not contribute to the World Bank and is a recipient institution for the World Bank's development projects. Thus, the African Union is not assessed for compliance with this commitment.

European Union: 0

The European Union has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries.

On 25 November 2024, the International Finance Corporation (IFC) announced USD605 million in financing for development projects in Egypt, focusing on the climate, sustainable tourism and micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises.¹²⁶¹ As part of this investment, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) will contribute USD100 million towards a USD300 million sustainability bond from the Arab African International Bank aimed at supporting "green financing, including industrial energy-efficiency, small-scale renewable energy projects and green buildings."

On 3 December 2024, Acting Head of Unit for International Partnerships at the European Commission Paz Velsasco Velazquez and Vice President of the Prosperity Practice Group at the International Development Association (IDA) and International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) Pablo Saaverda signed an administration agreement whereby the European Commission will contribute EUR8 million for the Umbrella Facility for Trade Multi-Donor Trust Fund 2.0.¹²⁶² Of this, EUR3.5 million was deposited at the time of signature, with EUR2 million expected to be deposited by 15 October 2025 and the remainder in 2026-2027.

On 13 December 2024, Head of Cooperation at the European Commission Stephane Meert and Director for Strategy and Operations at the IBRD and IDA Elisabeth Huybens signed an administration agreement whereby the European Commission will provide EUR2 million for the Public Expenditure Management Network in Asia Phase III Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹²⁶³ Of this, EUR1 million was deposited after signing, with the remainder expected during 2026-2027.

On 17 December 2024, the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD350 million IDA grant for a hydropower project in Tajikistan.¹²⁶⁴ The project will support access to reliable and sustainable electricity in the country and Central Asia. The project will be co-financed by several institutions including

USD550 million from the European Investment Bank and USD100 million from the Saudi Fund for Development.¹²⁶⁵

On 18 December 2024, Head of Unit at the European Commission Anne-Francoise Melot and Vice President Saaverda signed an agreement whereby the European Commission will provide EUR368,795 for the Finance for Development Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹²⁶⁶ Of this, EUR331,916 was deposited after signing with the remainder to be deposited in 2026.

On 19 December 2024, Director for Strategy and Policy Analysis at the European Commission's Directorate-General for Agriculture and Rural Development Catherine Geslain-Laneelle and Vice President of Planet at the IBRD and IDA Juergen Voegelé signed an administration agreement whereby the European Commission will provide EUR944,000 for the Food Systems 2030 Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹²⁶⁷ Of this, EUR500,000 will be provided by 31 January 2025 and the remaining EUR444,000 by 1 October 2025.

On 19 December 2024, the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved a USD245 million IDA credit to support the Zambia-Tanzania corridor project which aims to help Tanzania gain regional trade power and "increase power transmission capacity to southern regions of Tanzania."¹²⁶⁸ The European Commission will provide USD30 million in co-financing for this initiative alongside USD17 million from the United Kingdom Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's Energy Sector Management Assistance Program.

On 11 March 2025, Director for Employment and Social Governance and Analysis at the European Commission Jeroen Jutte and Director of the Development Impact at the World Bank Arianna Legovini signed an administration agreement whereby the European Commission will provide EUR500,000 for the Development Impact Multi-Donor Trust Fund.¹²⁶⁹ Of this, EUR300,000 was deposited at countersignature, EUR100,000 will be deposited by 1 December 2025 and the remainder will be deposited in 2026.

On 20 March 2025, the IFC announced three partnerships to support business and women's entrepreneurship and employment in Côte d'Ivoire.¹²⁷⁰ This includes a risk facility of up to XOF16.3 billion for women-owned and women-led businesses, in partnership with the Société Générale Côte d'Ivoire, a XOF6 billion for small and medium-sized enterprises focused on sanitation, trade, water, transportation,

agriculture and other sectors, in partnership with the Société Ivoirienne de Banque and an advisory program to support the Bridge Bank Group Côte d'Ivoire's lending capacity for small and medium-sized enterprises, including those owned by women. These three partnerships will be financed through the IFC's Small Loans Guarantee Program European Commission/Private Sector Window which uses financing from the European Fund for Sustainable Development to provide a first-loss guarantee.

On 4 April 2025, Executive Director Fuentes and the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors approved an IDA credit worth USD200 million for the Guinea Water and Sanitation Project.¹²⁷¹ The European Investment Bank will provide a EUR220 million loan and the European Union will provide a EUR26 million grant to co-finance this initiative which aims to improve water, sanitation, and hygiene in Guinea.

On 28 April 2025, the European Commission agreed to provide financial guarantees on up to EUR291 million to support risk management for the IFC, through the European Fund for Sustainable Development Plus.¹²⁷² This will support headroom finance and enable over USD1 billion in private sector investments for projects to support pressing challenges in LMICs.

On 30 June 2025, the World Bank Group's Finances One updated its Trust Funds Contribution by Donors visualization, based on the Contributions (Receipts) to Trust Funds dataset.¹²⁷³ The data reveals that the European Union decreased its contribution to the World Bank's trust funds from USD716,477,624 through the European Commission and USD43,502,344 through the EBRD in fiscal year 2024 to USD313,457,586 through the European Commission and USD5,679,082 through the EBRD in fiscal year 2025. This amount includes EUR2.5 million for the Umbrella Facility for Trade Multi-Donor Trust Fund 2.0, EUR500,000 for the Food Systems 2030 Multi-Donor Trust Fund and EUR100,000 for the Development Impact Multi-Donor Trust Fund. This action is antithetical to the commitment's objective of mobilizing more headroom finance for the World Bank.

The European Union has partially complied with its commitment to collectively mobilize more headroom and concessional finance to boost World Bank capacity to help low- and middle-income countries that need help in addressing global challenges, with a clear framework for the allocation of scarce concessional resources, and to provide strong support for the poorest countries. The European Union has taken strong action to mobilize more headroom and concessional finance through additional fund guarantees for the International Finance Corporation and co-financing the IDA and IFC's development projects. However, it has not taken strong action for a clear framework on the allocation of scarce concessional resources and has decreased funding for the World Bank's trust funds.

Thus, the European Union receives a score of 0.
